Life for Relief and Development just entered its 25th year. What a journey? From an idea and a one person office in California, we've travelled to a world-class relief and development organization that is operating across the globe. We started in 1992 as a response to the devastating sanctions on Iraq and reached our silver jubilee by responding to the Flint water crisis and distributing over 200,000 bottles of water. From Baghdad to Flint and everywhere in between, we were your message of compassion to humanity.

Year after year, your support and generous donations have made a significant difference in the lives of hundreds of thousands of people from Ghana to Palestine, from Haiti to Afghanistan, and to over 60 countries in between. Over \$400 million of your goodwill meant that deaf refugee children can hear, and draught stricken African tribes can drink clean water and offer some to their livestock. In 2016 alone we implemented projects in 27 countries spanning Asia, Africa, the Middle East, the Caribbean and America.


In the area of community and human development, Life helped build community centers in Africa. We also helped dig water wells in Ghana, Somalia, Ethiopia and Afghanistan. We continued to support over 4,500 orphans in several countries. The unfortunate reality is that natural disasters and wars have exponentially increased the number of orphans needing support.

Our traditional seasonal projects (Ramadan and Eid-al-Adha) were stronger than prior years, and, as a result, we were able to help many more needy families.

I take this opportunity to acknowledge and express my gratitude to the staff who were instrumental in implementing these projects, some at great risk to their own lives. As we celebrate 25 years, I also wish to thank Life Board of Directors for their wise counsel, stewardship and dedicated commitment in serving humanity.



LIFE TIMELINE

2016: Quadrennial report approved by the UN, aided Syrian refugees in the US and survivors of Hurricane Matthew in Haiti, first on the ground during Mosul Iraq crisis

2014: Signed agreement with UNRWA to aid Gaza, sent hospital beds, medical aid and medicines to Ebola centers in Sierra Leone

2012: Quadrennial report approved by the UN, funding from Mohammed Bin Rashid Charity in the UAE to construct 2 clinics and 4 schools in Iraq, aid to Hurricane Sandy in New Jersey

2010: Won Noble Humanitarian Award in Dubai, UAE, Haiti and Ghana offices open

2008: Quadrennial report approved by the UN, funding from Mohammed Bin Rashid Charity, Dubai to construct 3 clinics a high school in Iraq

2006: Awarded UN Habitat grant for Iraq, emergency team to Syria and Lebanon during Israel conflict

2004: Jordan office opens, provided aid to survivors of the Tsunami in Indonesia

2002: Afghanistan operations begin, 2 orphanages opened. Attended UN World Humanitarian Summit in Johannesburg, South Africa

2000: Repaired water treatment facilities in Iraq, Registered with USDA

1998: Name changed to Life for Relief and Development, Veterans for Peace partnership begins, Sierra Leone office opens

1996: Brother's Brother Foundation and Feed the Children partnership begins aid sent to Iraq, Lebanon and Sierra Leone

1994: Headquarters moved to Michigan

1992: Founded in California as a response to the Iraq war

2015: Dug water wells and supported a mobile clinic in Kyrgyzstan, aided families affected by the Nepal earthquake

2013: Registered with the USAID, Partnership with Relief International to provide humanitarian assistance to Syria

2011: Aided the people of Libya, Syria and Turkey and constructed and opened 4 community centers in Sierra Leone

2009: Sent 125 pilgrims to Hajj from African nations, established 9 libraries in Iraq, aided victims of Indonesian earthquake

2007: Aided survivors of Cyclone Sidr in Bangladesh, constructed 100 bed orphanage in Sierra Leone

2005: UAE and Nazareth offices open, emergency aid for survivors of Hurricane Katrina in Louisiana and the earthquake in Pakistan

2003: Joined the Interaction, Syria office opens, emergency aid to Iraqi's during USA war, awarded UNICEF grant to rebuild water treatment centers and schools in Iraq

2001: Aided victims of Bhuj, India earthquake, Pakistan office opens to aid Afghan refugees during USA war

1999: Consultative status with the Economic and Social Council of the UN, emergency team to Albania during Kosovo war

1997: Iraq office opens, Attended International Aid and Trade in Geneva Switzerland, aided refugees in Guinea during Sierra Leone civil war

1995: First container medical aid sent to Iraq

1993: Advanced ruling Federal Tax Exempt Status, granted tax exemption from federal government
